Proposal: Proposed addition of 4 poster boards on the theatre frontage

## Remit:

Theatres Trust is the national advisory public body for theatres. We were established through the Theatres Trust Act 1976 'to promote the better protection of theatres' and provide statutory planning advice on theatre buildings and theatre use in England through The Town and Country Planning (Development Management Procedure) (England) Order 2015, requiring the Trust to be consulted by local authorities on planning applications which include 'development involving any land on which there is a theatre'.

## Comment:

This application for listed building consent has come to the attention of Theatres Trust because it is seeking alterations at the Palace Theatre to provide new poster boards either side of the theatre's main entrance.

The Palace opened in 1920 as a cinema but with provision for live shows, which were held occasionally. After a period of bingo use in the early 1970s it was reverted to full-time theatre use in 1974. It is a Grade II listed heritage asset within the Newark Conservation Area. Its front façade follows the angle of the road junction and is

The National Advisory Public Body for Theatres. The Theatres Trust Charitable Fund co-operates with the Theatres Trust, has the same Trustees and is registered as a charity under number 274697

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divided into two bays by shafts with domed pinnacles rising above its parapet. Internally the auditorium has the appearance of an early music hall with balconies on three sides, the side balconies having later been converted into five boxes on each side. The ceiling is flat, made of eight panels each bordered with delicate plaster mouldings. Its fly tower is of unusual design with a mansard roof although this creates limitations because it is not possible to fly wide cloths and within the rear part nothing can be flown at all. The theatre has a varied programme and is highly regarded by local people. Paragraph 93 of the NPPF seeks planning decisions to plan positively for facilities of this nature.

Show signage and advertisements can be considered an integral and recognisable part of theatre design and character. The applicant has provided photographic demonstration that poster boards have been present at the proposed locations both in the recent past and historically.

The proposed poster boards are of modest scale and sensitively located in an appropriate position. We consider that these will positively contribute towards the theatre's character and significance as well as reinstate historic appearance. We therefore support the granting of listed building consent.
