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This theatre is a significant cultural asset and visitor attraction. Alongside the theatre itself it also has extensive grounds which include a garden/arboretum (Explorers Garden) to the south and lawns to its front on the northern side.

It is the grassed area to which this proposal relates. There is existing apparatus which was installed following a temporary consent in 2022. This was supported by Theatres Trust on the basis of helping to widen the reach and inclusivity of the theatre for families.

The theatre has special architectural interest and play equipment impacts on its setting and views towards the building from Port-Na-Craig Road and from across the river. In our previous comments we noted that any longer-term solutions needed appraisal of impact.

This proposal has responded to that, with the replacement equipment to be constructed of more sensitive and sustainable materials which better respond to the theatre and its location. Impact must also be considered within the context of the public benefits arising from helping to broaden the appeal of the theatre and increasing engagement with children and families. Ultimately this is also a reversible intervention.

We therefore support the granting of planning permission.
